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## **A REPLICATION PROJECT TO ACQUIRE PRAGMATICALLY USEFUL INFORMATION FROM THE FUTURE**

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**Background:** Using the Mobius consensus remote viewing protocol between 1978 and 1991, 537 people in the U.S., England, France, Japan, Jamaica, Mexico, and Canada described the future to 2050. They consensually predicted the disappearance of the Soviet Union, climate change, the rise of terrorism, the AIDs epidemic, the failure of antibiotic medicine, and a host of other consensual observations. In 2018, after assessing the accuracy of the 2050 data, a second round of the project was designed looking ten years further to 2060.

How accurate is this data? Based on the Mobius research in archaeological and criminological applications, typically 35-40% of the concepts proved impossible to evaluate. Of the remaining 60-65%, between 75-90% proved to be correct. The remaining 10-25% were judged to be "incorrect." Information of this quality, when applied to the future can be extremely valuable in helping to guide decisions and actions.

**Preliminary observations about the future:** Between 2040 and 2045 several dramatic changes alter the structure of human culture worldwide. It is not yet clear what they are, but two obvious candidates seem to be climate change and the end of the carbon energy era.

Climate change and sea rise have caused the submergence of coastal cities, and subsequent massive internal and international migrations for which much of the world is notably ill-prepared. In North America there have been large migrations away from coasts because of sea rise, out of the Southwest because of rising temperatures and lack of water, and out of the Central states because of violent climatic events like tornadoes.

People have largely re-organized into small communities. Lifestyles seem much more minimalist, more like the Nordic or Dutch aesthetic.

By 2060 people don't seem to move around as much as they do today, although air still exists.

In the United States racial and gender equality is the culture standard.

The United States still but real political power has devolved to states and regions, because of the radically different way in which states dealt with climate change and the migrations.

In the U.S. the illness profit system has given way to universal birthright single payer healthcare.

Transactions involving cash have disappeared, as have credit cards. Payment is made, depending on where one is, by a chip in the wrist, or a kind of smartphone.

In the months to come this preliminary assessment will be expanded in many ways, and a far more detailed consensus will emerge.

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
